Superintendent's Message

"We believe Mr. Macdonald possesses and demonstrates core values and abilities to continue our collective efforts to educate students based on what the 21st Century asks of them."

"I have high expectations for myself, and I will have the same for the staff at San Dimas High School," Macdonald said. "I am looking forward to working collaboratively with the staff to bring technology and learning together to ensure that our students are college and career ready."

One of his key initiatives will be to continue to build upon the strength of the vertical articulation between the elementary and middle schools that feed into San Dimas High School. "I am looking forward to conferring with principals and teachers, especially at Lone Hill Middle School, to continue to align learning and behavioral objectives so that the entire educational path in the District propels students toward achieving their goals," Macdonald said.

Macdonald says that he has an open door policy and that he loves to laugh. "Just because we have work, doesn't mean we can't have fun while doing it," he said. "My goal is for kids, parents, and staff to all enjoy their time on campus."

Macdonald has been an assistant principal at Cypress High School in the Anaheim Union High School District, at Seaside Middle School in Monterey Peninsula Unified School District, and at

Rancho Cucamonga Middle School in the Cucamonga School District. He taught as an adjunct professor at Azusa Pacific University. During that time, he was also a social studies department chair, AVID coordinator, and history teacher at Jehue Middle School and English learner support teacher at Rialto Middle School, both in the Rialto Unified School District.

"Education is my passion, so I am happy for an opportunity to grow in my career as principal of San Dimas High School," he said. "I want everyone to know that they will be supported by me and the District to get what they need to be successful."

Bonita Unified District Offices Temporarily Move to Pomona

The Bonita Unified School District offices will be temporarily moving to 801 Corporate Center Drive in Pomona (near Cal Poly Pomona) while the current offices undergo construction and modernization efforts as the final phase of the 2008 voter approved Measure AB.

The following offices will move to the new location on or before July 1, 2017: the Superintendent's office, Business Services, Educational Services, Student Services, Specialized Services, and Human Resources.

Departments currently housed in ancillary buildings on the District office campus will not move: Facilities, Transportation, Computer Information Systems, Food Services, School Age Care, Curriculum and Instruction, and Educational Technology. The displacement is expected to extend from 18-24 months while construction is in progress.

Out with the API, in with the California School Dashboard

In February, the California Department of Education (CDE) gave school districts their first look at the new state accountability tool, the California School Dashboard. Instead of measuring only standardized test scores and ranking schools from high to low as the Academic Performance Index (API) did, the new system is based on the State's eight educational priorities and gives schools insight into how they are doing in six key areas: standardized test scores in mathematics and

English language arts, English Learner progress, suspension rate, graduation rate, and college/career preparedness.

The Dashboard is an online tool that parents, teachers, and administrators can use to see the status of performance in the areas mentioned above. Each area is measured both by "Status," or the current school year's score, and "Growth," or improvement since the prior school year. A visual system of shapes and colors shows the school's performance. Bonita Unified's Dashboard was made available to the public March 15.

Two of the measures included in the Dashboard are student performance on standardized test scores in mathematics and English language arts. The test used for this measure, the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP), is in its third year of implementation in the State. This year's CAASPP testing window for Bonita Unified School District opens the second week of April and runs for two or three weeks at each school. The CAASPP includes computer adaptive tests in English language arts and mathematics as well as a new online pilot assessment for science.

Battle of the Bands

"The show attracts an audience well above 300 and is comprised of many students who do not participate in other school activities. Teacher band "In Danger of Failing" closes the show each year, with Eichen on drums. Battle of the Bands creates an opportunity for community involvement.

"This year, the prize packages include Swag Bags full of music gear and the opportunity to record a few songs, all donated by the community," Eichen said. "The judges are community members involved in the music industry, from private music instructors to music show owners to professional DJ's and musicians. The show is a mammoth operation, but it will be talked about for months to come, until we hold the next one."

Bonita Cooks It Up a Notch ProStart Culinary Competition

Bonita High School's Hospitality students competed against 30 schools in the State ProStart Management and Culinary Competition March 19-20, 2017, at the Sheraton Fairplex Event Center. Senior Drake Rubalcava received a \$2000 scholarship from BJ's Restaurant Foundation and was chosen as the BJ's ProStart student of the year. Teacher Laurie Brandler was selected as BJ's Management Teacher of the Year award, and Bonita High School won the Spirit award.

Students comprising three culinary teams and one management team practiced weekends and nights to prepare for the competition. In the culinary competition, teams created an appetizer, entrée, and dessert in one hour using only two butane burners. They were judged on knife skills, safety and sanitation, communication, plate presentation, technique, and taste.

In the management competition, the team created a restaurant concept including a written business proposal with concept, décor, floor plan, menu, marketing, recipe costing, and an organizational chart. Each team presented their plans with PowerPoint and a visual display board and endured a critical thinking Q & A session with a panel of judges. Prizes include trophies and over \$2.3 million in available scholarships.

Library Expansion

Over Winter Break, Grace Miller Elementary School dismantled a wall between the computer lab and the library in order to expand the library into one gigantic flexible-space for teachers to use with students. "Since we have enough Chromebooks and iPads in the classrooms, we didn't need the computer lab as much as we needed the flex space," Principal Deanne Spencer said. "The

library shelves now span the walls of both rooms, but the center area provides seating for reading and moveable tables for creative learning spaces. Teachers can configure the room any way they want so that students can create, collaborate and problem solve."

The room is equipped with several innovative Maker Space and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) materials that provide students opportunities to program robots, use animation cameras, build with LEGOs, use Strawbees and Code-a-pillars, as well as use Chromebooks and Osmo programs on iPads.
